Yes, it's been a fair old while since you last read one of these little inserts, hasn't it? - and an almost equally fair old while since I last wrote one, so excuse me if I'm a little rusty, and occasionally appear to have lost the toothpaste. Sorry, I mean plot. (Uh-oh, it's worse than I tortoise...)
